

PARKS & CONSERVATION

APEX PARK

EAST TERRACE, KINGSTON

Located at the entrance of the town with electric BBQ's, public toilets, children's play equipment and the Kingston Skate Park.

LIONS PARK

HANSON STREET

A fenced and shaded playground, public toilets, BBQ shelter and rotunda. Home of the Power Engine Cottage, which houses the 50 year old power engine, which provided electricity to Kingston until 1974. The engine was shipped from England to 'Port Jackson' in 1946 and it logged over 100,000 hours while in service.

BUTCHER GAP CONSERVATION PARK

OFF PINKS BEACH ROAD

Situated 6km south of Kingston, Butcher Gap Conservation Park is one of the last remaining significant coastal scrubs between the Coorong and Robe. This wetland area, encompassing Salt Lake and Butcher Lake, is separated by the Butcher Gap Drain. The park attracts an array of wildlife throughout the year. Seasonal waterbirds such as swans and white-faced herons frequent the lakes, while small bush birds may be seen along the park's scenic walking trails.

BERNOUILLI CONSERVATION PARK

CAPE JAFFA

A short walk south of Cape Jaffa is the Bernouilli Conservation Park, about 20 kms from Kingston. The park still contains the old lighthouse cottages that provided homes for the lightkeepers of Cape Jaffa. This 266 hectare reserve is named after Cape Bernouilli, the former name of the Cape Jaffa headland. There are many protected bird species living in the area such as the hooded plover, musk duck, superb fairy wren, and singing honeyeater.

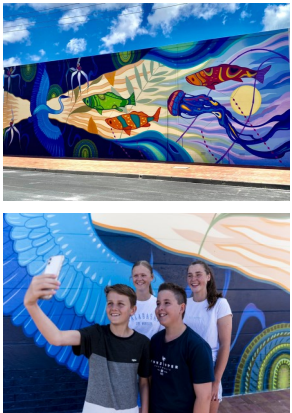

WIND DANCE

See South Australia's first augmented reality mural, 'Wind Dance', located in Kingston's main street, on the wall of the Kingston Electrical & Renovator Centre. Although beautiful to look at on the wall, by simply download the free EyeJack App, watch the artwork come to life onsite on your smartphone or device through augmented reality. The project is an Australian Government bushfire recovery initiative and was commissioned by the Kingston District Council in the wake of the Keilira bushfire in 2019.



THE BIG LOBSTER

The Big Lobster, affectionately known as 'Larry' is a must see when visiting Kingston. Standing 17 metres tall, 15 metres long, 13 metres wide and weighing 4 tonnes, Larry is regarded as one of the most impressive of Australia's 'Big Things'. Kingston's icon Larry, is located at 6 Princes Highway.

SUNDIAL OF HUMAN INVOLVEMENT



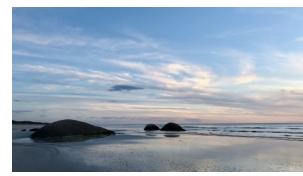
The Kingston SE Sundial of Human Involvement; known as an analemmatic sundial, is situated on a small island in Maria Creek adjacent to the Apex Park. The sundial is one of eight in the world. Numerous animal, fish and wave sculptures are also featured on and around the Sundial pieces.

THE CAPE JAFFA LIGHTHOUSE

Originally situated on the Margaret Brock Reef, 8 kilometres out to sea from Cape Jaffa, the lighthouse became Australia's first lighthouse to be dismantled and re-located onshore.

From its commanding position on Kingston's foreshore, it offers spectacular views from the top deck, as well as a glimpse into the incredible life of the lightkeeper, in a challenging workplace.

Open from 10am - 3pm during school holidays or at other times by appointment, 0427 854 175. The Cape Jaffa Lighthouse can be found at 32 Marine Parade.



THE GRANITES

The 200 kilometre long stretch of beach between Kingston and the Murray Mouth is known as the Coorong. Situated 20km north of Kingston towards Adelaide, the popular rock formation known as the Granites are the only interruption along the whole beach. They provide a focal point for fishermen and photographers alike.

NATIONAL TRUST MUSEUM

Step back into history to view the museum's extensive collection in the original 1876 J.J. Jarman building, 23 Cooke Street. See the amazing and intriguing items which give you a snapshot into Kingston's coastal and farming past. For all ages - well worth a visit.



HERITAGE TRAIL

Kingston offers a self-guided walking tour to its history which features 25 sites and has been designed to provide visitors with some background into the significant old buildings that give Kingston its unique yet relaxed character.
